Anticombinés and Antitrust: the Competition Law of Canada and the Antitrust Law of the United States. Roberts, R.J. Toronto: Butterworths 1980. Pp. xxx, 799. Written from a comparative point of view, this comprehensive text is intended as a reference book which explains the anticombinés laws, the antitrust law of Canada, to lawyers, law students and businessmen in Canada and the United States.

Doing Business in Mexico. Reiner, Theodore and Anne E., ed. New York: M. Bender, 1980. Cloth. This two volume set in loose-leaf for regular updating, compiles materials on commercial law, trade regulation (domestic and foreign) and taxation law and legislation as it affects doing business in Mexico.

Doing Business in the European Community. Drew, John. Boston: Butterworths, 1979. Pp. 180. Cloth. A short, concise manual for the manager and businessman on doing business in the European Community, well supplemented by charts, illustrations and anecdotes tying together the how-to text explanations with underlying policy considerations.

International Aggression: A Study of the Legal Concept: its Development and Definition in International Law. Rifaat, Ahmed M. Atlantic Highlands, N.J.: Humanities Press, 1979. Pp. xxiv, 355, Cloth. This study is designed to present to the non-specialist having general knowledge of international law, a correlated historical background of the evolution of international aggression from medieval times to the present.

International Law in Comparative Perspective. Butler, William E., ed. Germantown, Md.: Sijthoff & Noordhoff, 1980. Pp. vii, 315. Cloth. This is a collection of articles regarding the applicability of the comparative method to public international law.

International Politics and the Sea, the Case of Brazil. Morris, Michael A. Boulder, Colorado: Westview Press, 1979. Pp. xii, 291. Cloth. A survey of all aspects of Brazilian ocean policy, including domestic influences, naval affairs, offshore petroleum exploration, shipping and fishing, and a comparison of Brazil's ocean policy with policies of other states, both developing and developed.

Nationality and Statelessness in International Law. Weis, Paul. Westport, Conn.: Hyperion Press, 1979. Pp. xxviii, 338. Cloth. Examines nationality and lack of nationality, or statelessness, of indi-

viduals as a question of "public international law," rather than from the more common treatment as an aspect of municipal law.

Ocean Politics in Southeast Asia. Polomka, Peter. Singapore: Institute of Southeast Asian Studies, 1978. Pp. x, 235. Paper. This is a study of ocean politics and regional options of managing the potential benefits and wealth of the waters of Southeast Asia.

The Brazilian Economy: its Growth and Development. Bahr, Werner. Columbus, Ohio: Goid Publishing, 1979. Pp. 239. Paper. Provides a survey of the Brazilian economy, with an emphasis on its historical evolution and its present-day institutional setting.

The Federal Court Act: Administrative Law Jurisdiction. Mullan, David J. Ottawa: Law Reform Commission of Canada, 1977. Pp. vii, 117. Paper. Undertaken for the Law Reform Commission of Canada, this in-depth study outlines the statutory framework of the Federal Court's judicial review powers, makes a detailed examination of difficulties with this judicial review jurisdiction and makes various recommendations for restructuring the jurisdiction.

The International Regime of River Navigation. Vitanyi, Bela. Germantown, Md.: Sijthoff & Noordhoff, 1980. Pp. xii, 441. Cloth. Traces the foundation of international river law as developed by the treaties of 1814-15 and subsequent trends in later treaties, and highlights both the territorial scope of the regime and the applicable substantive law.

The Middle Eastern States and the Law of the Sea. El-Hakim, Ali A. Syracuse: Syracuse University Press, 1979. Cloth. Surveys the attitude of the Middle Eastern States to the law governing the use, conservation and delimitation of the sea and its resources, and provides source material for students of maritime law, particularly on maritime boundary questions.

The Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty: Origin and Implementation, 1959-1979. Shafer, Mohamed I. London; New York: Oceana Publications, 1980. Pp. xxiv, 1526. Cloth. This three-volume set is a revision of the author's thesis published in 1976 in Geneva, and is a comprehensive study of the background and development of the treaty on non-proliferation of nuclear weapons, and an assessment of steps taken towards its implementation.

Underdevelopment and the Development of Law: Corporations and Corporation Law in Nineteenth-Century Colombia. Means, Ro-

bert Charles. Chapel Hill: University of North Carolina Press, 1980. Pp. xx, 327. Cloth. From research conducted in Colombia between 1968 and 1970, this is a study of interaction between an underdeveloped national economy and the civil law as it relates to development of corporations and the legal rules governing those corporations.

Unperfected Treaties of the United States of America, 1776-1976. Wiktor, Christian L. Dobbs Ferry, N.Y.: Oceana Publications. 1976. An open collection of United States unperfected treaties through 1976, still in compilation, but indexed to date of original publication.

Venezuela at the Polls: the National Elections of 1978. Penniman, Howard R. Washington: American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research, 1980. Pp. xvi, 287. Cloth. In the historical context for the 1978 elections, this study describes the electoral process and rules for candidate selection, discusses the electorate and its political attitudes, analyzes the political parties and their campaigns, and reflects on the outcome.
