AUTO SAFETY REGULATION: THE CURE OR THE PROBLEM? Edited by Henry G. Manne & Roger L. Miller. Glen Ridge, N.J.: Thomas Horton Pub. Co., 1976. Pp. 144. (no price listed) The editors present a collection of articles which argue the dysfunctional nature of automobile safety regulations.

CIVIL LITIGATION AND THE POLICE: A METHOD OF COMMUNICATION. Robert H. Sulnick. Springfield, Ill.: Thomas Books, 1976. Pp. 143. \$10.75. This book develops a methodology of sociolegal investigation. Specifically, the discrete perspectives of law and social science are utilized in conjunction to study the functioning of police bureaucracy. The book has interesting implications of possible channels of communication between social science, law and modern bureaucratic institutions.

DIVORCE OR MARRIAGE: A LEGAL GUIDE. Howard L. Bass. Englewood Cliffs, N.J.: Prentice-Hall, 1976. Pp. 209. \$9.95. This book provides a lucid authoritative guide to the legal intricacies of marriage, divorce, and custody problems.

INDIAN LAND TENURE: BIBLIOGRAPHICAL ESSAYS AND A GUIDE TO THE LITERATURE. Imre Sutton. New York: Clearwater Pub. Co., 1975. Pp. 290. \$6.95 paperbound.

INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC LAW I: INTERNATIONAL PRIVATE INVESTMENT. Andreas F. Lowenfeld. New York: Matthew Bender & Co., 1976. Pp. 495. Paperbound (no price listed). This volume examines problems a lawyer may encounter in handling international private investment. As illustrations, the author presents a thorough study of ITT in Canada and Kennecott Copper in Chile. The book also contains an extensive cross section of sample documents.

INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC LAW II: INTERNATIONAL PRIVATE TRADE. Andreas F. Lowenfeld. New York: Matthew Bender & Co., 1975. Pp. 302. Paperbound (no price listed). This volume illustrates the problems a lawyer may encounter in dealing with international economic transactions. The appendix containing sample documents is particularly useful.

INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC LAW III: TRADE CONTROLS FOR POLITICAL ENDS. Andreas F. Lowenfeld. New York: Matthew Bender & Co., 1977. Pp. 885. Paperbound (no price listed). The third volume in

this series examines the use of trade controls for political ends utilizing as illustrations the Arab boycott of Israel and the United Nations sanctions against Rhodesia. These examples highlight an examination of the interrelation between private activity and public law. As in the first two volumes in the *INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC LAW* series, sample documents make up a significant portion of this volume.

LABOR RELATIONS IN THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SERVICE. Murray B. Nesbitt. Washington: The Bureau of National Affairs, Inc., 1976. Pp. 545. \$17.50. An examination of the origins and consequences of the industrial relations program initiated by the federal government in the early 1960's which sought to provide federal employees with greater opportunity to participate in the administration of their jobs. The book traces the history of public employee unionism, treats the theoretical aspects of public sector labor relations and reviews basic clauses in federal contracts. Finally, the author discusses issues arising from public employee strikes.

1977 GUIDEBOOK TO FLORIDA TAXES. Chicago: Commerce Clearing House, Inc., 1977. Pp. 116. \$6.00 paperbound.

OUTSIDE THE COURTS: A SURVEY OF DIVERSION ALTERNATIVES IN CIVIL CASES. Earl Johnson, Jr., Valerie Kantor & Elizabeth Schwartz. Denver: National Center for State Courts, 1977. Pp. 107. \$6.50 paperbound. An analysis of alternative methods of civil dispute resolution which lie outside the formal judicial system such as arbitration, no-fault laws, ombudsmen, and probate administration reform.

TAKING RIGHTS SERIOUSLY. Ronald Dworkin. Cambridge, Massachusetts: Harvard University Press, 1977. Pp. 293. \$12.00. Mr. Dworkin argues against the "ruling" theory in Anglo-American law—legal positivism and economic utilitarianism—and asserts that individuals have legal rights beyond those explicitly codified and that they have political and moral rights against the state which take precedence over the welfare of the majority.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION LAW AND INSURANCE. Albert J. Millus & Willard J. Gentile. New York: Roberts Pub. Co., 1976. Pp. 466. \$20.00. This book is designed to provide a basic understanding of the workmen's compensation law and its concomitant insurance system. The book is divided into two sections. The first treats the law, its coverage, benefits, and administration. Part two, which

deals with the Natural Standard Workmen's Compensation and Employer's Liability Policy, includes chapters on premium determination and individual risk rating plans.
